As school leavers contemplate their futures, one important skill with the power to open doors and change lives stands out: the ability to speak more than one language.



I didn't realise how many doors speaking French could open. Once I knew basic grammar and vocabulary, it became easier to talk with native speakers, it allowed me to immerse myself in their culture, it gave me a real sense of freedom, and personally, I gained so much confidence.
